DEACON THOMAS L. ADAMSON

Deacon Thomas L. Adamson was born on April 19, 1938 in Roanoke, AL to the late Raymond and Ida Adamson. He was united in holy matrimony to Julia Morgan Adamson and to this union four children were born.

In 1949 at the age of eleven, Thomas gave his life to Christ and united with Wehadkee Baptist Church. While there he served as a member of the church choir.

Thomas received his education at Macedonia Church School, Wehadkee Church School, Saint Paul Church School and the Randolph County Training School. In the summer of 1953, he received his first job working at Randolph County Hospital. In 1969, Thomas started working for Handley Mill and remained there until the Mill closed in 1980. Thomas then began working at Plantation Pattern as a supervisor over maintenance/grounds, and housekeeping. He retired in June 2000. In his career, Thomas also made history in 1972 becoming the first black police officer in Wadley, AL. He also worked for the Roanoke Police Department over 17 years. Even after retiring he served the Roanoke community as a Reserve Officer. In all the success he attained, Thomas' passion for singing continued to grow.

He was an anointed soloist that could sing anything anywhere at anytime. He later became a member of the Rehope Baptist Church in Five Points, AL where he was ordained as a deacon and served in the choir. Thomas lived by his motto "If I can help somebody along the way, then my living will not be in vain."

Thomas was preceded in death by his parents, Raymond and Ida Adamson, his brothers, James Adamson and Raymond Adamson, and a sister Naomi Bell. He leaves to cherish his memories five children, Wesylon L. (Gertrude) Adamson of Welch, AL, Victor L. (Betty) Adamson of Las Vegas, NV, Gwyn L. Adamson, Sasser L. (Casey) Adamson, and Kimberly L. Adamson all of Roanoke, AL; one sister, Janie L. Adamson of Columbia, SC; one sister-in-law, Mattie Adamson of Roanoke, AL; a special friend, Barbara J.
